What is Honesty?

- 1. Being truthful to others.
- 2. Being truthful to yourself.
- 3. Doing what's right regardless of who's around.
 - 4. Being someone others can trust.

Suggestions for Parents to Work with Children at Home:

1. Talk with your children about honesty. Try to answer; 'What is honesty?' What is the difference between the truth and a lie? Discuss some examples.

2. Share the story of the boy who cried wolf. Talk about a time when someone told you something that wasn't true. How did it make you feel? Do you trust that person to tell you the truth now? Why or why not?

3. Talk about promises the children have made or promises others have made to them. How serious is a promise? How does it feel when someone breaks a promise?

4. Who are the most honest people you know? How do you know they are honest? How do you feel about these people?

5. Talk about a situation where you or they have been worried about telling the truth about something because you thought it would get you into trouble.

6. Watch a movie, such as The Lion King or Pinocchio, in which honesty and truthfulness are major themes. Encourage your child to talk about ways the main characters demonstrate honesty and dishonesty. Please let your child's teacher know if we can celebrate any work from home, here in school. Feedback on the values and what you do at home is really valuable to us and we really appreciate all your support.

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10 Top Tips for ...

We all want to continue being informed and inspired by the ever-expanding capabilities of the internet. But we also need to be able to safeguard ourselves against the growing amount of online hazards. Knowing what is fact, understanding what dangers exist and taking appropriate steps can go a long way towards protecting yourself and your family. National Online Safety has collaborated with the Yorkshire and Humber Regional Cyber Crime Unit to compile 10 pointers to help you keep your children safe from cyber crime.

Spot Phishing Bait ١.

Phishing messages are untargeted mass emails asking for sensitive information (e.g. usernames, pasavords, bank details) or encouraging recipients to visita faise website. It's safest to learn the warning signs of phishing and increase your child's awareness. Too good to be irve? Spelling or punctuation errors? Odd sense of urgency? These are all red flags. Don't dick on links or follow demands:if you're unsure, contact the official company directly online to enquire further.

Encourage Strong Passwords

Weak passwords make it faster and easier for someone to gain access to your online accounts or get control of your device – giving them a route to your personal information. For a strong password, national guidance recommends using three random words (e.g. bottle garagepyions). Consider paying for your child to access a password manager. courage them to have a separate password for eir email account. Ensure the whole family uses ro-factor authentication where possible.

5. Back up Your Data

rme cyber attacks can lead to the the ft or deletion important (and possibly se nabled) data or loss of so (like photos and vide os) that can't be replaced, icking up your data to the cloud - or to another of la device — will help prevent data loss if you ever become the victim of a cyber attack. Where possible, set your child's devices to back up automatically. Also encourage them to back up their data prior to installing any update

Take Care When Chatting

Criminals may look to manipulate others online commons may look to manipulate others online and coerce them into using their talents or cyber skills for une thical means. Try to get your child to be open about who they are talking to online. Communication tools such as Discord are popular among gamers – but be cautious of the there ends using them, and music workness. other people using them, and ensure you know who your child is chatting with.

9. Understand Their Motivations

Those being influenced online to use their skills Insee being insuenced online to use metracias unothically may display certain key warning signs. Sudden evidence of new-found wealth (unexplained new clothes or devices, for example), so ce cy around their online behaviour or boasting of new online friendships are all causes for concern. If in doubt, refer through to your regional cyber clime team.

Don't Over-Share

Is your child sharing too much on social media? Do they past things about their private life, upload images of your home, or discuss their friendships and relationships online? Criminals will east only and relationships online? Criminals will gather this information and may try to use it for identity theft or other offences such as fraud. To combat this, ensure your child's privacy settings me an they are only sharing information with family and close friends. Use parental controls where appropriate.

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4 Stay Updated

ople often put off installing updates to apps or Itware because they don't feel it's necessary, it software because they don't feel it's necessary, it can be time consuming, or could cause problems with programmes they rely on. But update shelp protect users from recently discovered vulnerabilities to malware. You can usually set them to run automatic ally – en courage your child to select this option. Ensure updates are installed as soon as possible after you're notified they re available. iry, it

Be Wary of Public WiFi 6.

Free public WiFi is commonplace – but it's aften not se cure and sende une norygled data via the network. A hacker on the same network could access personal data (file financial information) without you even realising they'd done so. To avoid this, suggest to your child that they use their 3G or 4G mobile data when they're out and about, rather than free WiFL. Cansider purchasing a VPN (Virtual Private Network) where passible.

Recognise Warning Signs

Often, budding cyber experts will relish the challenge of testing themselves or earning recognition from peers for their exploits. Even principle d white-hat' hackers will look to test their skills online. If you think your child is interested in hacking, try to understand what their motivation is. You could encourage their participation in a their experiments are been participation in ethical competitions such as bug bountles.

Know the Consequences

Many young people may feel that hacking is essentially a light-hearted prank, and not especially serious. So make sure your child is aware of the implications of a conviction und the Computer Misuse Act – not only the possibility of a criminal record, but also lifelong travel restrictions and damage to their future career or educational prospects.


We thought the event was a great success and was enjoyed by all who attended, and this wouldn't have been possible without your support and participation and for that we're truly grateful.
